A Highlight at the Annual AGM Auckland 16–17 March 2023

A highlight of our Annual Conference and AGM was the presentation provided by **Helen Robinson**, the Manutaki or City Missioner, based in Auckland. Her presentation entitled "Giving Thanks for What Was, Looking Forward to What will Be, Standing in the Now" was truly inspiring.

Helen opened stating that we were here at the AGM in Auckland because of our Whakapapa – the work that our ancestors/past generations have done for our Society in the past 150 odd years. We are also a part of something that is so much bigger than our Vinnies Organisation here in New Zealand.

"Overwhelmed" by the depth of need in our country was Helen's response to need - the restoration of 'what is right' by giving a hungry person food with dignity. Helen described our leadership as a 'gift we have been given' to help restore what is wrong and laying a pathway for the future. Currently, the City Mission in Auckland are providing **50,000 food parcels per year** (sized at 3 meals for 4 people for 4 days).

Her analysis of need shows that-

- 1 in 5 have insufficient money for food,
- 1 in 2 are located in South Auckland,
- The burden of providing food for a family is carried by women esp. those with children,
- The lack of adequate housing availability,
- Growing concern at lack of people at centres, churches providing the required leadership to help & guide our future generations,

She also stressed the importance of Youth Services to stand beside this emerging group.



Helen concluded that the reality that poverty in Aotearoa was that it has both a **colour and a gender!** She sees 'poverty and desperation' as a huge burden across the country – that we need to right this wrong whenever possible! Her dream is-

- For homeless to be rare, brief, and non-recurring
- For Zero hunger
- For an equitable Aotearoa for all.

Helen concluded that we must also stand by our younger generations. As our ancestors did many years ago, we need to " take the now and give birth to the future ."

Update - OZANAM APARTMENTS

In August 2023, the Ozanam Apartments opened their doors, providing transitional housing for eight young families so far. Transitional housing offers more than just shelter to a family, it offers stability and a safe space to work through life's challenges.

Grateful for the opportunity, families settled in, appreciating basic comforts. There was a lot of joy in the little things initially, an oven that worked, a drier, and space for their little ones to run around. Families have enjoyed hearing the stories of the many people who have donated and made this dream of housing support for young families, a reality.

With stable accommodation it became possible for families to start putting down roots and dreaming bigger dreams. Families have been enrolling their kids in preschool and school, while some parents got part-time work to help their family through challenging financial times. We have seen families supporting each other through difficulties and sharing together as they grow their community.

The young parents development team are slowly and steadily building relationships with families. As expected trust takes time to build, especially as we operate in a system where our young people have been met with discrimination and judgment. We continue to make significant progress in establishing our commitment to non-judgmental support that enhances the lives of our young people.





There is a lot of challenge within our communities with the cost of living crisis, it is indeed tough times. Our young families are feeling the brunt of this with housing discrimination and extremely difficult financial times. Yet they amaze us with their resilience and their ability to keep moving forward for their family. The young parents development team are enjoying walking alongside these young families. There have been challenges and successes that we have walked alongside.

We look forward to continuing to journey with our young families as they build community and work towards the dreams they have for their little ones."

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT IN SELWYN

St Teresa of Calcutta Conference located in Selwyn is a relatively new Conference ad came into existence about June 2021. This is when we opened a bank account and began serving the needy of our district. We serve the whole of District, which is a huge area, running from the Rakaia River to the Waimakariri River and from the sea to Arthur's Pass. A year later, Mike Daly - then President of the Canterbury Area Council - approached me about assisting in resettlement of a refugee family, through the CORS program. Our Conference accepted this challenge, albeit with little real understanding of what was involved. With God's help and considerable help from the St Vincent de Paul CORS group in New Plymouth, we became officially recognised as a CORS group early in 2023 and so were able to sponsor refugees. The immigration process is a long one. We have developed a resettlement plan and all the attendant paperwork, as well as allocating responsibilities and a resettlement timeline. As part of this process, we have developed good relations with other charitable Christian organisations, most particularly in Rolleston with the Hope Church and Salvation Army. Their help has been most valuable.

We are now in the position where we will shortly welcome the new arrivals, who are expected in April. I earnestly ask you all to pray for the success of this mission, and the successful integration into New Zealand society of this family of eight, whose journey to join us began well over a year ago.

From the GM's Desk

As I write this on the news in the background there is more restructuring and more potential layoffs of people. That leads to thinking of the impacts for Vinnies and our operation. Last month our food bank supermarket bill was \$10,000 odd dollars. This amount is more than double what it was 12 months ago – so the impact of higher prices, more demand, school assistance program and closure of a supplying food bank is being felt.

Our welfare program for society finished the calendar year (Jan 2023 – Dec 2023 inclusive) with 8689 completed and closed cases, up some 1560 cases or 22% up from the previous year. We saw furniture supplies run out several times and demand for food up. Pressure on grants and donations is increasing. And shop trading has had its highs and lows. Polly Fisher the shop manager from Papanui held a "Vinnies Meets Vogue" sale on St Patricks' day – in an hour and a half she took \$5,100 and proceeded for the next week to have a great sales week earning \$25,555 for 6 days trading. Well, done Polly and the team. The reality is these funds are needed to ensure we achieve what we can for our mission.

We welcomed Cyrene (Young Vinnies / Young Adults) and Wayne (Logistics) to our team and recently, we bid farewell to Anna – the Stanmore Shop Manager. Anna made the decision to pursue working for herself. In the 2 years Anna has been with us she ran an auction window, focus on antiques, and then put together a skill-based training program for paid staff. Well, done Anna, and thank you for the contribution to our society over the last 2 years – we wish you all the best for the next stage in your life.

And finally, a big thank you to our many supporters who have generously donated to the Society during the past months. **Robyn Casey**

WELFARE UPDATE

Our key welfare focus for 2024/2025 has been to develop a new initiative that will directly benefit school students, and their families, and also – indirectly the staff and management of both Catholic and non-Catholic schools here in Christchurch. "Making a real difference "and identify what is not happening that really should be happening in our schools, but for the want of money.

We asked the schools to tell us what many families struggle with financially. The main areas identified were:

- E devices
- Stationery / Books
- Clothing (uniforms, sports clothing & equipment)
- Camp fees
- Kai for breakfast/lunch
- Transport (bikes)

This financial year we will have helped a mix of six Catholic and non-Catholic high, and primary schools with financial support. For our next financial year, we plan to again continue this welfare initiative for the children and teens at our schools here in Canterbury.

Mike Moore's observations re welfare

A couple of weekends ago, I had the privilege of meeting Helen Robinson, City Missioner in Tamaki Makaurau (Auckland). During her presentation she advised that currently, the City Mission are providing some 50,000 food parcels each year. She stated that she was "overwhelmed" by the depth of need in our country.

In Canterbury, demand at Vinnies is nearly 20% of what is provided in Auckland by the City Mission. However, that volume in itself has been challenging for many of our Conference volunteers and our staff given the limited volumes of food that is currently available for repurposing from the supermarkets. This situation has not been helped of course, by the closure of Foodbank Aotearoa late last year that has resulted in a number of smaller foodbanks in Canterbury also being forced to close.

The Society is hugely grateful to the many parishioners across Canterbury who willing donate dry foods each week whilst others donate financially to the Society. This, nevertheless, is insufficient to meet the current demand for food and must be supplemented by purchases by the Conferences and at the Area Council level. Demand for support in January and February 2024 has jumped by a hundred cases compared to the same period last year – and since the January - February period in 2020, demand has grown by over 35% for this same period in 2024.

Thank you again to all our donors and supporters for your generosity and help. The Society is truly grateful.

Cyrene Tionko: About me


